### Tracks

**Note:** All incoming students are placed in English I or II based on placement testing. Honors differentiation can occur within the same class or, once a grade reaches 20+ students, as a separate Honors section for grades 9 and 10.

## DUAL ENROLLMENT • Upperclassmen (Grades 11–12)

---

Dual Enrollment is available to upperclassmen (grades 11–12) who need to complete a required course that is not offered at the school during the current academic year.

Students may enroll in an approved course through Madison College or Liberty University Online, with prior administrative approval. Dual enrollment is intended to supplement the school's curriculum—not to replace courses already offered on campus.

### Guidelines:

Available to 11th and 12th-grade students only

Limited to one course per semester

Courses must fulfill a graduation requirement or support a student's academic pathway

Students may not take a dual enrollment course that duplicates a course offered by the school

All courses must be approved in advance by administration

Credit toward graduation will be determined on a course-by-course basis

## ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) COURSES

---

Advanced Placement (AP) courses are high school courses designed to function like college courses. These are both to challenge students and potentially help them earn college credit. Each AP course is concluded with an exam created by College Board. Students who enroll in AP courses are required to sign up for that class's AP exam, which costs \$55 per exam.

## STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

---

The school is committed to meeting students where they are. Student Support Services are available to any student who needs additional academic help — whether due to a documented learning difference, an identified area of need, or a temporary academic challenge.

Support is provided on an individual basis and scaled to each student's needs. The specific structure of these services — including any formal accommodations, intervention plans, or specialized instruction — will be worked out with families before or at the start of enrollment. Families with known needs are encouraged to share that information during the admissions process so the right support can be in place from day one.

**Note:** *The scope of Student Support Services will grow as enrollment grows. The goal is simple: every student should have what they need to succeed academically, spiritually, and personally within this community.*
